"Electron Microscopes: their history and forensic application"

This was going to be the November 2012 talk but Nick unfortunately could not make it.

Nick will give us a short history of the development of the electron microscope. From the optical microscope of the 1590s and transmission electron microscopes of the 1930s to the modern day scanning electron microscopes. Then a look at the forensic applications of the SEM in the investigation of crimes at the nanogram level. Including fascinating studies of

cases with gun shot residue and a murder involving duck feathers!

Another feature from "How I started in radio" How it all Began: Pt.2 Geoff Plucknett G4FKA



I passed the RAE at Mid Herts College in Welwyn Garden City in December 1972 and was licensed as G8HGP on 9th March 1973. The first rig was an SCR522 (the BC624/625 pairing) modified for 144 MHz, the transmitter being pictured below.



My first QSO with that rig was on 12th March 1973 at 19:25 with Ron G3NVL in Luton. No big DX at 15 miles but the first contact all the same and bearing in mind my antenna was a wire dipole taped to the curtain rail, not a bad start. The station evolved through various transmitters and receivers and the eventual configuration of a 55w FM transmitter; a Solid State Modules converter into a Telford TC7 tuneable I/F; and an 8/8 on a 30 foot mast got out very well. Repeaters were also arriving on the scene in the early 1970s and with that FM set-up from a site over 400 feet ASL I got into many a repeater and even joined the London-based UK FM group.

In those days, mobile licences came separately and although at 16 I was too young to drive I got one anyway and eventually ended up with various portables operating /M on bikes, buses, trains and even the London Underground. Not sure it would be allowed now!

In the early days I was always what you would call a social amateur, keen on rag-chew QSOs, rallies and the local club. I was first on the Stevenage club committee at 15 and became its chairman at the ripe old age of 23. We did quite a few special event stations and the photo here shows me operating the VHF station for the local "Stevenage Day" event in 1974. (love the hair - Ed!)




There were early signs of the contest bug that would become a major interest as I see from the log book that I made my first contest exchange less than two months after being licensed in 1973. I went on to do a bit of contesting with the Stevenage club (G3SAD) and the 3 Stevenage G8H stations (HGP, HQQ, HUB) also did a bit of VHF contesting. I still remember our little tent with a Pye Vanguard, an 8 element beam, a stove and copious beans on toast!

With university looming in 1976 and the prospect of operating its HF station in the Liverpool students union building, I decided it was about time I got a full licence so after lots of practice with Ron G4DDX and Frank G3OVT I did the morse test at the post office building at St Martin's Le Grand in London in August 1976 and was licensed as G4FKA on 14th September 1976. Success was celebrated straight afterwards by a drink with Walt G3NYY who worked at the same office. I operated quite a bit from the University station (G3OUL) on HF and VHF and was the club chairman for two years. After graduation I moved back to Stevenage and a few of us formed the Stevenage Contest Group with the wonderful call sign G4VAT. My future in contesting was assured!
