Prof Cathryn Mitchell BSc PhD: Bath University

You may remember we had an absorbing talk last year on Cathryn's studies involving solar ejections in the polar regions.





The largest solar storm on record occurred on 1 September 1859. Known as the Carrington event, it was observed by British amateur astronomer Richard Carrington. He noticed bright white flashes on the sun and hours later came the impact on the earth. Telegraph communications failed – sparks showered around telegraph connections and fires were started. Auroras were seen widely across the earth.

Could such a solar storm happen now? What if it did - are we prepared? Do we get any warning? How would our modern world be affected?



Cathryn explores the likely impact of a modern solar storm on satellites, communications, transportation and power and describes the measures in place to mitigate the effects of such an event.

and nowThe Local GB2RS News Bulletin

A few months ago I happened to hear the GB2RS news being read on a Sunday morning on the Cheltenham and Gloucester repeater, GB3CG on 145.600Mhz. Checking with RSGB HQ if this could happen on one of the Bristol repeaters I was informed there was no reason and it would be a "good idea." There were some historical reasons why this had not happened but I contacted John G4TRN who takes up the story

I first read the GB2RS news as a stand in for Martyn G3RFX, way back in August 2000. Much has altered since then. It has not been an easy experience especially on 80m.

At first I received the script by fax, progressing to down-loading it and printing it. Now, I read it from a computer screen (much cheaper and environmentally friendly into the bargain).





Since Martyn resigned, I have been the sole reader on 70cms, alternating on 2m with Cyril G2HDR (who I have known since I was fifteen), and an occasional reader on 80m. It is very difficult to find new recruits and I welcome John Parris 2E0CRI (pictured left) to the happy band of GB2RS news readers.

Progress now beckons and, by the time you read this, the 70cm broadcast will be from GB3ZB, high up on Dundry rather than from the black hole of deepest Redland. The coverage, and hopefully the number of listeners, will be much greater.

Although I will still be reading the script, for 70cms it will not be "live" from the shack. I will be making a recording and then uploading it via broadband, to the Linux computer system controlling the repeater. Thanks to Matt G4RKY for his assistance in this project.

One gets very fussy with recorded audio. The shack is comparatively noisy so I will be working from a 'studio' (my living room) with a high quality microphone and a lap-top computer. The resulting file has to be converted to a format to suit the repeater's computer and reduced in size to save upload time and storage space. I won't bore you with the details; it was complicated at first. This is all a far cry from old fashioned amateur radio. Where would we be without WiFi!

The picture shows my set up: Zoom H2 microphone, lap-top, Icom IC32E for working GB3ZB and the essential mug of coffee. The mug on display is the GB2RS 50th anniversary special edition sent to all news readers in 2005. I used to listen to Arthur Milne G2MI in Bromley who was the very first reader, on 80m, when the service started in 1955!

How does it work?

Weekly classes that take you through the official textbook (covering about 6 /7 pages a week).

Classes are in central Bath and run every Wednesday 7-9pm for six weeks.

The training is arranged around the RSGB book, *Foundation Licence Now!* The book is now in its 5th Edition and can be bought from us as part of the course, from the RSGB shop online, or from sites like Amazon, but check on the edition number!

What is the exam like?

The Foundation exam is a multiple choice paper with 26 questions based on the material covered in the course. The pass mark is 19, which is 73%. It will be marked immediately to give you an indication of whether you have passed and the formal results come out about a week later;
