We begin this month with another feature from "How I started in radio"

contributed by Steve G3ZVW, well known for his editing of the RSGB Yearbook and articles in Rad Com. He is also an active member of the Bristol RSGB Contest group.

How it all Began:

I was brought up in a house the stairs was stocked with longed to my dad who, in 1949, components. It contained lots of where the cupboard under electronic parts. They behad built a television from EF50s! He had also built a port-

able Medium Wave radio using miniature valves. Along with the components, unfinished and non-working projects also sat in boxes in the cupboard, while the TV (which had never worked well and had been replaced by a commercial model) had been relegated to the garden shed. Little boys like to build dens and naturally while I was in the cupboard under the stairs I started twisting wires together, playing with electric bells and buzzers, connecting resistors to meters to indicate voltage, etc. As I was showing interest in such things I was also bought some of the electrical and electronic kits that were available in the 1960s. One of them enabled me to build a crystal set and a 1-transistor amplifier.

After a while I went on to wind my own coils and build crystal radios from circuits in books. Some worked better than others and one day I stumbled across something that put me on the path to where I am today. The year would have been about 1967. I had made a crystal radio that I had plugged into my Ferguson reel-to-reel tape recorder (which could also be used as an audio amplifier), but I hadn't wound enough turns on the coil so instead of the tuning range being about 500kHz-1500kHz it was closer to 1MHz-2MHz. Something I heard fascinated me. It was one side of a conversation. Clearly the guy speaking was local. He identified himself as G3WKQ, gave his name as Adrian and location as Palmers Green (I lived there too). Over the following weeks I listened again and again, occasionally hearing him, but also a mobile station. All on AM, of course. This was it, I was hooked. Soon after I was bought a communications receiver for a Christmas present. It was a 'modern' 4-valve receiver from Japan, but extremely basic. It had a BFO, but drifted quite badly. However, now I was able to listen to amateurs on the HF bands and resolve the new mode of the day – SSB!



At about this time I also started to experiment with transmitters. I built a single transistor transmitter that could be heard four houses away on the family's Bush TR81 radio, but when I built a transmitter using two EF50s in a kind of multivibrator oscillator I could hear it several streets away. I was so scared I ran all the way home to switch it off!



In 1969 I joined my first radio club (Southgate) and met – amongst others – G3XSV (Current Chairman of the Bristol RSGB Contest Group) and G8ASR (now G4ASR of the VHF Rad Com column). Also, with the express permission of my school headmaster, I started an RAE course at the local Technical College. In 1970 I passed the RAE, got thrown out of school for not passing my other exams (although I did get to finish building the chassis and case of a Top Band AM transmitter in the metal workshop), passed my Morse test and started 'work' as an apprentice in the International Telegraphs division of the Post Office. My first QSO was on 25 November 1970 with G3VWZ. My callsign confused the hell out of him.

So basically you've all got my dad to blame!

Sadly I never got to thank G3WKQ for introducing me to amateur radio. In one of his QSOs I heard him say that he was going into hospital for an operation. Although he was quite young, he died.
